## **The Director's Chair**

Our community is well known for helping others in need. This has been demonstrated over and over again through benefits, fundraisers, and volunteer efforts. I am encouraged by the support that this community gives to those who need it.

We recently hosted a series of Women Build events, and had a record turnout of volunteers who primed and painted a new construction house and helped to deconstruct a house which we will rehab. Pictured on the right are two amazing women ready to tear down insulation.

As a member of 100+ Women Who Care of Dickinson County, I am amazed each quarter by the power and excitement generated in a room full of women looking to give back to the community.

#### **Growing Need Right Here at Home**

Habitat has long been involved with performing repairs and improving accessibility to income qualified home owners. In recent years we have been able to perform critical repairs (roofs, septic systems, furnaces, windows) along with exterior painting and wheel chair ramps. Many of our repair families are elderly and on fixed incomes. In many cases their choices have been either to repair their home or to buy medicines or food.

Through the generosity of this community we have been able to help 20 families a year with these needed repairs, which allows them to stay in a safe home in a decent neighborhood with their dignity and lifestyle intent.

The benefits of living in safe permanent homes have long been documented. Children do better in school when they do not have to worry about where they will sleep, or when they will have to move again. Habitat's home ownership program helps income qualified families to buy their own affordable home.



And we can't forget about the common areas of our community that we share with each other; parks, sidewalks, playgrounds and walking trails that make our community a good, attractive, healthy and safe place to live. Habitat was involved in the renovation of both the North Side Park in Iron Mountain and the 3rd Ward Park in Norway. We plan to work on the Stanton Street park in Iron Mountain in 2019.

#### A Hand *Up* versus A Hand *Out*

**Dedicated** Volunteers, **committed** Donors and **thoughtful** Sponsors work with Habitat for Humanity to find solutions for housing, home repairs and community revitalization right here in our town. Work continues at 1005 Adams Street in Quinnesec as the new home nears completion. In early May, several Women Build teams primed and painted the interior of the home clearing the way for next steps in the project.

Although there is still a long list of work items such as completion of electrical, plumbing, cabinetry, finish carpentry, flooring, and landscaping, our teams of volunteers should have this home ready for

occupancy by mid-summer.

Over the past 5 years we have increased our efforts for owner occupied home repair projects. These repair families must meet our income guidelines as well as own and occupy the home.

As shown in the table, we increased the number of repair projects from 16 in 2015 to 21 last year. We already have completed 6 with another 14 in process in 2018.
